A Jewish Perspective

Purim, also called Feast of Lots, is a joyous Jewish festival commemorating the survival of the Jews who, in the 5th century BCE, were marked for death by their Persian rulers. The story is related in the biblical Book of Esther. Haman, chief minister of King Ahasuerus, was incensed that Mordecai, a Jew, refused to bow down to him. He convinced the king that the Jews were rebellious and should be slaughtered. With the king's consent, Haman set a date for the execution (the 13th day of the Hebrew month of Adar) by casting lots.

Purim is celebrated among Jews by the reading of the *Megillah*, the Book of Esther, in the synagogue. Jews are also enjoined to exchange gifts and make donations to the poor. Other customs include wearing masks and costumes, public celebrations and parades, and eating three-cornered pastries called *hamantaschen*, literally "Haman's pockets." This year Purim begins at sunset on March 6 and ends at sunset on March 7.
